PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Members,

Throughout 2019, Tasdance continued its artistic revitalization and organisational renewal.

Under the assured artistic leadership of Adam Wheeler, Tasdance increased significantly its artistic presence around the state at festivals, within our immediate Launceston community, and through teaching and performing at many schools. Tasdance appeared at numerous sites - theatres, beaches, in rivers and on riverbanks, nightclubs, parks and online – engaging professional artists, aspirational dance students, and members of the community.

It was an exciting and heady mix playing to many thousands of Tasmanians and audiences on the mainland, too.

The 2019 AGM endorsed a new constitution, aligning it with contemporary governance practice and refining overarching organisational objectives, including specific acknowledgement of First Nations people. We thank members for their wholehearted embrace of these necessary and vigorous changes.

Sadly, Maggie James a key figure in the formation of Tasdance and a former President, passed away. Maggie was Tasdance's first Life Member, and remained passionate and committed to Tasdance to the very end.

In 2019 Tasdance welcomed Ben Lovitt, Simon McKenzie and Emma Porteous to the board, confirmed appointments of Kai Beyerle, Alison Jales and Ron Layne, and re-elected Trish Dunn and Peter Matthews; all of whom joined continuing director Pat Chilvers. The board has given outstanding service in complex times for all arts organisations as funding from state and federal governments continues to reduce in real terms while simultaneously competitiveness increases.

While Tasdance's support from the state government is reduced, the company has attracted increased funding from the federal government and from various state community agencies, too. General Manager Ali Copley has steered the company through these turbulent waters and, once again, Tasdance finished 2019 in a strong financial position.

Tasdance's future is very promising, but challenging. Arts funding is fiercely competitive and it is likely to remain that way for sometime. We believe, however, our artistic attainments and aspirations, excellent management, and robust governance prepares Tasdance to meet these challenges.

CO-CEO REPORT

Like many arts organisations across Tasmania and indeed Australia, much of 2019 was spent formulating ideas, cooking up projects, advancing concepts and honing an artistic vision for the company supported by sound strategic planning for multi-year funding applications to both Arts Tasmania and the Australia Council.

Artistic Director, Adam Wheeler's vision for Tasdance was seeded in 2018. In 2019, Tasdance 'watered' it and the vision grew, presented in both the five-year artistic plan and strategic plan for the major funding agencies. Whilst still a sapling in the 38-year history of Tasdance, the vision to CREATE – EXPOSE - TRANSFORM draws on our rich history as an important contemporary arts organisation that makes professional dance works, engages with its communities, and educates through dance.

Create innovative, engaging, professionally rigorous and intrinsically Tasmanian dance from our regional base.

Expose artists and audiences to courageous large-scale dance projects that intertwine professional practice and community engagement.

Transform the understanding that Tasmanians have of themselves, their communities, their culture and their individual and collective potential through dance.

The year started positively in January, presenting *Yatra* at Mona Foma; a partnership with Launceston-based Bhutanese/Nepalese community that melded community and contemporary arts practice. In September, Tasdance presented the works of the five talented Tasdance ensemble dancer/makers - Sofie Burgoyne, Gabriel Comerford, Rachel Arianne Ogle, Thomas E.S. Kelly and Isabella Stone - in *First Floor* at Junction Arts Festival. *First Floor* was the final work created by this ensemble. Tasdance sincerely thanks Sofie, Gabe, Rachel, Thomas and Izzy for their commitment over 2018–19 and wishes them all the very best as they move on to their next artistic adventures

In 2019 Tasdance launched The Public Program comprising The Tasdance School of Dance and Adult Casual Classes, which attracted both ongoing and new enrollments, and energized the community.

Toward the end of 2019, we welcomed new ensemble members, Kyall Shanks, Amber McCartney and Jenni Large to the fold who joined existing member Gabriel Comerford to round out the new team of professional dance artists.

As Tasdance continues to CREATE, EXPOSE and TRANSFORM we look forward to building upon our relationships with the community as well as our presenting partners, such as the myriad of Tasmanian and national festivals that continue to program Tasdance works.

Bolstered by a third consecutive year of operating surplus, the ongoing support of a dedicated Board and staff with talented new ensemble members, and an invigorated artistic vision and strategic plan, Tasdance is primed for a dynamic future.

Create innovative, engaging, professionally rigorous and intrinsically Tasmanian dance from our regional base

PROFESSIONAL PREMIERES

Yatra - Mona Foma - January

Choreographed by Gabriel Comerford, featuring Benge Allen, Sofie Burgoyne, Rachel Arianne Ogle, Isabella Stone, Bun Mon Rai, Obeth Sampang, Bijay Tamang, Binod Biswa, Yadav Mangar, and Susmita Pradhan. Drawing on the journey of Tasmania's Bhutanese community's flight from refugee camps in Nepal to settlement in Launceston, *Yatra* played to 600 people over three sold-out performances.

First Floor - Junction Arts Festival - September

Concept by Adam Wheeler, choreographed and performed by Sofie Burgoyne, Gabriel Comerford, Thomas E.S. Kelly, Rachel Arianne Ogle, and Isabella Stone. Audiences perambulated through the streets of Launceston to view five solos in secret first floor locations. *First Floor* was sold out and received five star reviews.

WORKS IN DEVELOPMENT

Reactor - November

Stompin and Tasdance collaborated for the first time to develop a fully interactive dance work challenging the notions of power, control and our relationship to them.

Concept by Adam Wheeler and co-directed by Caitlin Comerford, *Reactor* featured a new Tasdance Ensemble (Amber McCartney, Olivia McPherson, Kyall Shanks) and six core Stompin dancers. The companies worked for one week before testing the idea with a public audience. *Reactor* will premiere at Mona Foma 2020.

Kanaplila Ngari - December Think Tank

Produced by Tasdance, *Kanaplila Ngari* is a cross-cultural dance project led by Trawlwoolway artist Sinsa Mansell (Pakana Kanaplila, TAS) and Bundjialung-Yugambeh, Wiradjuri artist Thomas E.S Kelly (Karul Projects, QLD). Sinsa and Thomas in collaboration with Palawa singer songwriter Dewayne Everettsmith (TAS), James Mangohig (Skinnyfish Music, NT) and augmented reality (AR) artists Soma Lumia will create the first major Tasmanian Aboriginal contemporary dance work created and presented at major multi-arts festival, Mona Foma.

EXPOSE

Expose artists and audiences to courageous large-scale dance projects that intertwine professional practice and community engagement.

LOCAL FNGAGEMENT

Stompin

Since August 2018 Stompin has been the youth company in residence at Tasdance. The company has their own office space and dedicated weekly studio time. Tasdance views this partnership and support as a vital professional pathway for young Tasmanians to develop and pursue a career in the creative industries.

The Australian Musical Theatre Festival

Adam taught a master class and participated in a round table discussion about pursuing a career in the arts as part of the inaugural Australian Musical Theatre Festival in 2019. Tasdance provided the festival with office space leading up to the event.

Women Dance for Peace

Presented for the third year in a row and in partnership with the Tamar Valley Peace Festival, Alison Jales the President of the Tasdance Friends and a member of the Tasdance Board facilitated this community dance event for women and girls of all ages and cultures. Women from the many cultural groups across Launceston attended. This event is a wonderful celebration, particularly for some cultural groups where women are not allowed to dance in the presence of men.

Family Day Care

You are never too young to learn how to dance and in 2019 Tasdance and Family Day Care began a new partnership which brought educators and their children into Tasdance for a workshop with Adam. Thirty next, next generation dancers explored creative pathways and learnt new moves.

STATEWIDE ENGAGEMENT

Mapali - Ten Days on the Island March

Adam and Tasdance artist Isabella Stone worked in collaboration with the Ten Days on the Island Artistic Director Lindy Hume and Tasmanian Aboriginal artist David Gough to present *Mapali* at the Bluff in Devonport. The official opening of the festival celebrated Tasmanian Aboriginal stories of the North West Coast and International Women's Day. Over 100 local community members performed at 7am to an audience of 1000 people.

DRILL Choreographic Program

In 2019 Adam was the facilitator of DRILL's inaugural choreographic program. Five emerging choreographers from Hobart made site-specific works responding to different spaces around Salamanca Arts Centre. The four week long engagement culminated with a free showing with approximately fifty people attending.

Dance Tasmania

Dance Tasmania continues to grow in strength and numbers. The committee consists of invested Tasmanian dance makers and teachers who meet quarterly. Dance Tasmania has allowed the sector across the State to share happenings, as well as identify state-wide and naiton-wide concerns that as a group can respond to.

Tasmanian Youth Classical Ballet Company

The Tasmanian Youth Classical Ballet Company took up residence at Tasdance every Saturday afternoon. The Launceston contingent were taught weekly by Tasdance Head of Ballet Development teacher Alison Winn.

NATIONAL ENGAGEMENT

SIMULCAST - Dance Massive, March

Tasdance, Chunky Move and Yellow Wheel partnered for the first time to present *SIMULCAST* at Dance Massive 2019. Led by Alice Lee Holland, 300 Victorians met and rehearsed every weekend over eight weeks to perform alongside world-renowned dancer, James O'Hara. An audience of 2000 people headed to Burrung Marr to witness this massive endeavour.

SIMULCAST Bendigo, October

Tasdance continued to work with Alice Lee Holland, Chunky Move and this time the Greater City of Bendigo to create *SIMULCAST Bendigo* presented as part of *Encounter* and literally performed on the Old Poppet Head in Rosalind Park, Bendigo. Sixty performers from regional Victoria danced with Daniel Riley to an audience of 600+.

GUTS at Dance Massive + Mexico

Tasdance built a new partnership with GUTS Dance, Alice Springs as Adam facilitated in a support and operations role of their tour of *The Perception Experiment* to Dance Massive, Melbourne and Festival De Mayo, Guadalajara México.

The Australian Youth Dance Festival (AYDF)

Adam continued his investment in the development of next generation dance artists as the Associate Director of the Australian Youth Dance Festival. Adam taught warm up, master classes and workshops while supporting the Ausdance Victorian team. Adam is also a member of Youth Dance Australia who support the biennial festival. In 2019 AYDF went global for the first time with youth dance companies from England, Singapore, Scotland, Denmark and Finland attending.

Yellow Wheel in Alice Springs

Adam's last project as Artistic Director of Victorian based pre-professional dance company Yellow Wheel was to tour his 2016 work, QUARK to Alice Springs. In consultation with GUTS Dance, Yellow Wheel taught workshops and performed in schools, ran a workshop for the community and presented a two night season as part of Desert Festival 2019.

National Dance Company's Meeting Dance Massive

Adam and Ali represented Tasdance at the annual National Dance Company's Meeting. The industry has seen a large shift in leadership across a number of companies. These events are incredibly important for Tasdance to be present at and vocal about the Tasmanian sector and its relationship with the mainland.

The National Dance Forum - Darwin

Adam and Ali also attended the biennial gathering. In 2019 the festival focused on First Nations practice, mature age practice and making and living in regional Australia.

TRANSFORM

Transform the understanding that Tasmanians have of themselves, their communities, their culture and their individual and collective potential through dance.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Critical Path + Dance Hub SA

Tasdance continued the partnership which began in 2017 with Critical Path, Australia's leading centre for choreographic enquiry, research and development based in Sydney. This partnership supports a visiting international dance artist in-residence at Tasdance for two weeks period directly before or after their residency at Critical Path in Sydney. In 2019, Tasdance welcomed London-based choreographer Pepa Ubera.

The partnership with Dance Hub SA (formeley Leigh Warren Dance Hub) known as *Mind the Gap* began in 2018 when two South Australian dance artists (Rita Bush and Cathy Adamek) travelled to Launceston. This partnership, a meaningful connection between our island-state to the mainland, continued in 2019. Tasdance hosted Adelaide-based dance artist Diane Reid for two weeks and, for the first time, Dance Hub SA hosted a Tasmanian dancer, Benge Allen.

The benefits of the *Mind the Gap* program are: time to extend artistic language and ideas; space to explore creative scope, inspiration and possibility; networking and new collaborations; and, developing new audiences for contemporary dance.

2019 Residencies + Secondments

Tasdance residencies offer an exciting opportunity for professional dance artists and choreographers Australia-wide, for both project-based and research-based residencies. Artists have access to the Tasdance Studio and stay on-site in the Tasdance Cottage, which provides space and time for reflection, invigoration, collaboration and response.

Coupled with each residency is a public showing or workshop, where members of the community are invited to experience the work in development, and provide feedback to the artist.

In 2019 the program comprised: 16 weeks at Tasdance, 11 on-site residencies by 15 artists who shared their research and development with the community in nine studio showings. Tasdance welcomed 12 secondment students in 2019.

MAKE Choreographic Intensive

Now in its second year, *MAKE* is an initiative to support choreographic practice in Australia. Tasdance hosted new Tasdance Ensemble member Jenni Large for a week-long rigorous choreographic exploration, while sharing and developing crucial choreographic devices to create powerful contemporary dance works.

Eighteen participants comprising a mixture of recent graduates, established choreographers and teachers from across Tasmania, the mainland and New Zealand attended MAKE.

Island Lab

Tasdance continues to provide opportunities for outstanding artists to come together, share practice and create space for new ideas to be born. This inaugural program celebrated cross cultural First Nations dance practice between Tasmanian and mainland Aboriginal artists, as well as experimental new technologies.

PUBLIC PROGRAM

Tasdance School of Dance + Adult Casual classes

Formerly known as the Tasdance Studio Classes (TSC) the new Public Program consisting of the Tasdance School of Dance and Adult Casual Classes offered 13 dance classes per week across the four school terms, attracting enrolments of around 100 students.

Benge Allen (Hip Hop), Alison Winn (Ballet) and Rikki Mace (Contemporary) were joined by Adam who offered monthly improvisation classes. The Public Program is managed by Shannon Douglas, Public Program Officer in close consultation with Adam and Ali.

dancemaker

Now in its third year this important performance event was held on June 29 and attracted 240 audience members to the Tasdance Studio. The focus of *dancemaker* is to give students an opportunity to explore, make and perform their own dancing in a supportive setting.

End of Year Showcase Concert

For the first time, Tasdance held the End of Year Showcase at The Annexe Theatre in the Inveresk Precinct, Launceston on December 14. All students, ably prepared by their teachers, performed to an audience of over 400 parents, friends and supporters in attendance over two sessions.

The Borovansky Ballet Exams

The Borovansky Ballet exams were held for the third time in September enabling ballet students to advance their ballet training inline with The Australian Institute of Classical Dance (AICD) syllabus.

Dance for Schools - TROLLS

Tasdance began as an education company, making exceptional contemporary dance works for schools. In 2019 Tasdance reestablished making dance works specifically to be presented in schools and tackle issues relevant to students.

TROLLS was created by Adam, Gabriel Comerford, and Cody Lavery and supported by secondees, Kady Mansour and Nikki Muscat. A 30 minute interactive dance where the dancers and audience have to answer to a talking computer Karen. The work used actual trolling from the students to explore developing resilience around cyber bullying.

Tasdance in Schools

The MEDAL program (Movement Experience Supporting Dance and Literacy) was designed and launched in 2015 to build literacy skills through dance. MEDAL can be adapted to suit the age, skill base and achievement standards in each school environment. The program entails an expanded understanding of the term 'literacy' with an emphasis on students making and responding in dance to increase their vocabulary, communication skills, creative and critical thinking, problem solving and confidence.

In 2019 MEDAL continued at East Tamar Primary for the fourth year in an expanded form with each class from kinder to Year 6 engaging in a weekly half hour dance class. Rikki Mace again delivered the program in its entirety across four terms, receiving warm and ongoing endorsement from all students and teachers.

Exeter Primary Residency

Adam and dance teacher Chloe Dobson spent four weeks with the year 3/4 classes of Exeter Primary School exploring the notion of cyberbullying through the TROLLS education program. Exploring a different theme and choreographic concept of TROLLS with each class and delving deeply into physical responses to, and stories associated with, their respective concept. The four week in-school residency culminated in a celebration and sharing at the school attended by family and friends of the students.

Margate Primary Residency

Following on from the success of the school residency in 2018, Tasdance took four dance teachers, Gabriel Comerford, Chloe Dobson, Cody Lavery and Adam to Margate Primary School (30 minutes south of Hobart) for a one week in-school residency program. Tasdance worked with the teachers and the principal at Margate to devise a workshop program that complemented the school curriculum. Tasdance has been invited to return to Margate Primary School in 2020.

OPERATIONAL REPORT

In 2019 Tasdance built on the financial and operational foundations set in the previous year, returning another operating surplus at the end of the year contributing to the organisation's cash reserves.

Tasdance was pleased to report a final operating surplus of \$39,812. This result was achieved through a mixture of successful funding applications to philanthropic agencies, and by setting realistic budgets for both core operations and creative projects.

Tasdance implemented a new constitution at its 2019 AGM ensuring Tasdance remained at the forefront of contemporary governance practices. The new constitution's principal purpose was technical refinements such as a sharper distinction between the Friends and Members of Tasdance, and the nomination and election of Directors. The objectives of the organisation remained largely unchanged, except for the introduction of a statement acknowledging First Nations people.

OTHER FUNDING + PHILANTHROPIC SUPPORT

In 2019, Tasdance received both financial and in-kind support.

Tasdance's application to the Department of Communications and Arts - Indigenous Languages and Arts Program (ILAP) for the *Kanaplila Ngari* project for \$156,633 (gst exclusive) was successful. The funds are distributed over two financial years 2019/2020 - \$79,183 and 2020/2021 - \$77,450.

Tasdance received \$20,000 from the WD Booth Trust for the Kanaplila Ngari project.

COMMISSIONS, PERFORMANCES FEES + OTHER EARNED INCOME

Earned income for 2019 was \$146,137 compared to \$84,644 in 2018. This income is a mixture of commission fees from presenting partners such as Mona Foma, fees earned through the Education Program, Public Program enrolments and box office sales.

CORPORATE SPONSORSHIP

The 2019 sponsorship strategy of a tiered model remained in place with all sponsors, receiving appropriate benefits for their contributions.

FINANCE

Tasdance recorded an operating surplus of \$39,812 in the twelve months to 31 December 2019, compared to a surplus of \$28,974 in 2018.

This surplus was largely due to a mixture of successful funding applications, realistic budget estimates and focused work by directors and executive staff to ensure Tasdance has robust internal budgeting, monitoring and reporting processes. Staff have worked diligently to consolidate controls and internal systems, informing reporting and predictions.

The annual turnover for 2019 was \$622,758 compared to \$595,926 in 2018.

At 31 Dec 2019, Tasdance cash reserves were \$227,782, an increase from 2018 (\$187,670). Reserves are a healthy 36% of annual turnover.

This End of Year surplus ensured Tasdance reached its target of \$200,000 in reserves twelve months earlier than the anticipated.
